HIV/AIDS Bibliographies: Rural HIV/AIDS



Introduction

Once thought of as an urban disease, the prevalence of HIV and AIDS in the rural United States is steadily increasing. AIDS in rural communities affects migrant workers, adolescents, African-Americans, men who have sex with men, heterosexuals, and men and women from all walks of life. Susi Miller compiled this bibliography for the Resource Library of the Columbus AIDS Task Force in September 2003. Susi worked at CATF while completing her practicum for a Master's degree in Library and Information Science from Kent State University. Funding for the Resource Library bibliographies is provided by a grant from the National Library of Medicine. This bibliography is a starting off point for those interested in researching or simply learning more about the rural HIV/AIDS epidemic in the United States. Items marked with an "RL" can be found in the Resource Library of the Columbus AIDS Task Force.



Books & Book Chapters

Whetton-Goldstein, K. (2002). *You're the first one I've told: new faces of HIV in the South*. New Brunswick, NJ: Rutgers University Press. **RL**

Data from a unique HIV/AIDS survey and health statistics from the Southeastern United States are combined with the personal experiences of twenty-five people living with HIV/AIDS in rural eastern North Carolina.

Verghese, A. (1995). *My own country: a doctor's story*. New York, NY: Vintage Books. **RL**

A physician specializing in infectious disease shares his story of practicing in rural Tennessee in the 1980's. A well-written account of the AIDS epidemic in a small Appalachian town.



Documents

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). (2000). *Pathfinder – a guide to selected resources: HIV/AIDS and other STDs among rural populations*. **RL**

Publication of the CDC's National Prevention Information Network (NPIN). Provides Rural AIDS/HIV/STD resource lists and contact information for: organizations, funding opportunities, Internet resources, and educational materials.

Eta Sigma Gamma (National Professional Health Education Honorary). (1996). HIV/AIDS education in rural communities. *The Health Education Monograph Series*. 14(1): 1-47. **RL**

First in a series, this publication includes topics such as: modeling the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Indiana, HIV infection and women, and prevention activities for adolescents.

Eta Sigma Gamma (National Professional Health Education Honorary). (1997). Prevention of HIV/AIDS: education in rural communities. *The Health Education Monograph Series*. 15(2): 1-51. **RL**

Second in a series, this publication includes the following topics: migrant farm workers in Indiana, Use of condoms among African-American students, breaking confidence about risky behavior, school-based interventions and more.

Eta Sigma Gamma (National Professional Health Education Honorary). (1998). The third special issue on HIV/AIDS education and prevention in rural communities. *The Health Education Monograph Series*. (16)2: 1-66. **RL**

Third in a series, this publication includes topics such as: implementing HIV education, rural adolescent views of HIV prevention, and health motivation and HIV risk behavior among college students.

HIV/AIDS in rural areas: lessons for successful service delivery. (2002). Washington, D.C. : U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration, HIV/AIDS Bureau. **RL**

Detailed review of four rural AIDS projects funded by the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act. Locations include: Texas, Mississippi, Colorado, and Vermont.

Migrant health services directory 2002 – La Guía. (2002). Saline, MI : Migrant Health Promotion. **RL**

Spanish/English state-by-state directory of health services and clinics for migrant workers. Midwest edition includes information covering the following states: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota, Ohio, and Wisconsin.

Rural AIDS Housing: issues and opportunities. (1998). Seattle, WA : AIDS Housing of Washington. **RL**

Report on the state of rural AIDS housing issues in the state of Washington. Includes discussion of needs assessment surveys, development of local housing networks, case studies in other states, and funding suggestions and contacts.



Journal Articles

Casteneda, D. (2000). HIV/AIDS-related services for women and the rural community context. *AIDS Care*. 12(5): 549-65.

Discussions of the differences in care and care-seeking behavior in women in the rural vs. urban setting.

Kistner, J., Eberstein, I.W., Quadagno, D., Sly, D., Sittig, L., Foster, Leukefeld, C.G., Logan, T.K., Farabee, D., Clayton, R. (2002). Drug use and AIDS: estimating injection prevalence in a rural state. *Substance Use & Misuse*. 37(5-7): 767-82.

Analysis of injection drug use and HIV in rural Kentucky using two approaches: drawing data from secondary sources and primary data analysis from three small community studies.

McKinney, M.M. (2002). Variations in rural AIDS epidemiology and service delivery models in the United States. *Journal of Rural Health*. 18(3): 455-66.

Review of AIDS surveillance data and the rural health literature to summarize what is known about the rural AIDS epidemic.

Marick, J. (2002). HIV/AIDS peer education: a rural health project. *Journal of School Nursing*. 18(1): 41-7.

Describes a project completed by rural Nebraskan high school students designed to inform their peers about the risk of HIV/AIDS. Students were advised by community health leaders.

Salgado de Snyder, V.N., Diaz Perez, M., Maldonado, M. (1996). AIDS: risk behaviors among rural Mexican women married to migrant workers in the United States. *AIDS Education & Prevention*. 8(2): 134-42. **RL**

A study of women at high risk for HIV transmission. The women live in rural Mexico and are married to temporary migrant workers in the United States. Sociocultural context included in discussion.

Schur, C.L., Berk, M.L., Dunbar, J.R., Shapiro, M.F., Cohn, S.E., Bozzette, S.A. (2002). Where to seek care: an examination of people in rural areas with HIV/AIDS. *Journal of Rural Health*. 18(2): 337-47.

Presentation of estimates from the HIV Cost and Services Utilization Study (HCSUS). Analysis of rural residents with HIV/AIDS, their demographics, location of their health care providers, and drug therapy prescribed.

Steinberg, S., Fleming, P. (2000). The geographic distribution of AIDS in the United States: is there a rural epidemic? *Journal of Rural Health*. 16(1): 11-9.

Analysis of the geographical distribution of AIDS in the U.S. based on data reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in 1996.

Stevenson, J. (2000). Rural HIV/AIDS in the United States: studies suggest presence, no rampant spread. *Journal of the American Medical Association*. 284(2): 167-8.

Discussion of studies showing steady presence rather than rapid spread of HIV in the rural U.S.

O'Sullivan, S., Preston, D.B., Forti, E.M. (2000). Predictors of rural critical care nurses' willingness to care for people with AIDS. *Intensive & Critical Care Nursing*. 16(3): 181-90.

Survey study of 957 nurses in the rural northeastern United States. Questions and statistical analysis of respondents' views on homosexuality, risk of contracting HIV, and nursing care concerns.

Wykoff, R.F., Heath, C.W., Hollis, S.L., Leonard, S.T., Quiller, C.B., Jones, J.L., Artzrouni, M., Parker, R.L. (1988). Contact tracing to identify human immunodeficiency virus infection in a rural community. *Journal of the American Medical Association*. 259(24): 3563-6.

Description of a rural South Carolina contact study conducted to identify, counsel and educate persons infected with or exposed to HIV. Study begins with one HIV positive man and his 19 sex contacts; 83 men are included in the study.



Videos

Belinda. 30 minutes. 1992. **RL**

Documentary featuring Belinda Mason, an Eastern Kentucky woman who was the First HIV-infected member of the National Commission on AIDS.

Soft Smoke: AIDS in the rural West. 28 minutes. 1999.

This video follows Roy, who works for the Colorado Health Department, as he travels the back roads of rural Colorado informing residents of their possible exposure to HIV. A powerful documentary and reminder that HIV/AIDS is not limited to big city life.
